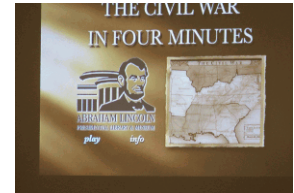
SEPTEMBER MEETING —

SEPTEMBER PROGRAM: This month we did not have a speaker, so two members, George Payne and Larry Morris, showed some programs through the video projector. First, Larry played a video titled “The Civil War in Four Minutes”. I purchased this video at the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum in Springfield, IL. The Museum displays this animated program continuously. In a scale of one week equals one second, the video shows the ever changing battle lines as a nation tears itself apart. In the corner, a casualty counter tracks the mounting numbers lost to disease, capture, disfigurement and death.

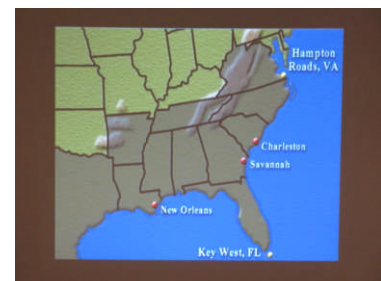


Prof. Gary Gallagher

George Payne showed two videos from the “Great Courses” program “The American Civil War” presented by well know history professor Gary Gallagher. Dr. Gallagher is Professor of History of the American History at University of Virginia. He has received numerous awards for his research and writing.

This course presents 48 lectures presented by Dr. Gallagher with various photos, illustrations, and maps; some of which are included below. George showed lecture #30 , The Naval War and lecture #31, The River War and Confederate Commerce Raiders. George felt those subjects would be appropriate since we will have a program on *The Hunley* next month.

The Great Courses are college-level courses on CD, DVD and digital formats. There are a variety of subjects presented by professors chosen for their ability to teach. There is also an option to purchase a complete transcription of the lectures in a course guidebook.



JOURNALS, DIARIES and LETTERS, ETC.:



EYEWITNESS: THE CIVIL WAR — Lt. Silas T. Grisamore was a quartermaster of the 18th Louisiana infantry regiment on the day before the Confederate attack on the Union army at Shiloh. As the Confederate army marched toward Pittsburgh Landing on Saturday, April 5th Grisamore recorded in his journal:

“April 5th — This morning it was late ere the troops were put in motion. As we had left with three days cooked rations, our provisions were getting scarce, and a detail was left with the commissary train to cook. The march was slow and tedious, the roads being blocked with wagons and advancing troops. At sunset I reached the camp of our brigade, being in line near the enemy on the left of the road leading from Purdy to Pittsburg Landing. Col. Mouton immediately ordered me back to bring up a wagon with cooked rations. It was with difficulty that I could get back on horseback. The roads were full of the troops of Gen. Polk’s division and the numerous wagon trains. However, I finally got a start, but after striving and working until midnight, I was compelled to halt. It was a beautiful clear night, and when I woke in the morning I found everything covered with white frost. The whole army was encamped in the line of battle extending from Lick Run to Owl Creek, and a distance of four or five miles, and directly in front of the enemy.”

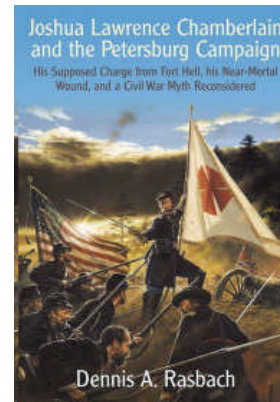
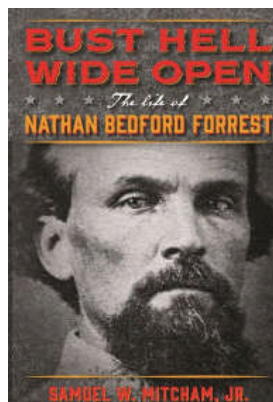
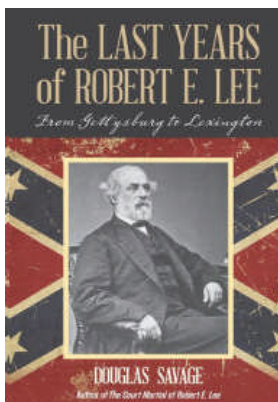

“Several days ago (Sat., Oct. 8) my wife and I walked into a yard sale in Rockport, IN. It was at a house on a high bluff overlooking the Ohio River, and I gotta tell ya, there can’t be very many places anywhere with a better view. The items for sale were pretty standard, but books were mentioned in the newspaper ad, among which was a quantity of Civil War books. I’m enclosing a copy of the obituary for Ronald Straughan. The books were his, and we didn’t get there in time to see all of them. His speciality was C.W. in Missouri. He grew-up in, or had ancestral connections with, the Pilot Knob area.
